The Climate of Oklahoma.

A few misguided and misinformed people have recently made some very unkind, untrue, unmitigated and uncalled for remarks about the climate of Oklahoma in general and of Chelsea in particular. The truth of the matter is that there is more climate in Chelsea in one of these long summer days than there is in some of the older states in a whole month.

It is very healthful, too. And pleasant, did you know that Chelsea lies at about the same latitude as the Garden of Eden? The Garden of Eden was situated between the Tigris and the Euphrates and Chelsea lies between Grand river and the Verdigris. And as for the daughters of Eve that live here, we are so used to swallowing whatever they give us that we would not balk at green persimmons or underripe peaches, much less at apples.

Oklahoma lies between the same parallels of latitude as Palestine, Syria, Persia, China and Japan. It is the salubrity of the climate and the wealth of the country that has brought Oklahoma into public view.

In the early times Oklahoma had such a reputation for healthfulness that many of the Spanish explorers lost their lives trying to come here and drink of the fountains of youth. Senor Alvar Nunez Cabeza de Vaca came to Oklahoma in 1534. In 1541 Don Francisco Vazquez de Coronado with a number of speculators and tourists from New Spain spent the summer hunting in Oklahoma (there being no game law at that time). About the same time Lieutenant Don Luiz de Moscoso de Alivera and a party of dead game sports who had spent the winter playing chuck-a-luck and monte in Arkansas, presumably at Hot Springs, came to Oklahoma but found that it was a dry state without a single saloon and went on to Mexico.

Afterwards Bonilla, Humana, Onate and other inveterate tourists were attracted to Oklahoma and 1891 Padre de Sales opened the first church. Now all this happened long before Jamestown was settled and long before the Pilgrims landed on Plymouth rock and received Boston baked beans with brown bread, codfish balls, mince pies and other New England dainties. We will not take up your time by telling of the later immigrants, of Castillo, of St. Denis, du Tissent, du Bourgement, Brevel, la Bruyere and other noted men of that time. Later, after Oklahoma had been fought for by the Spanish, English and French, it passed under the authority of these United States and soon thereafter a great many men were attracted to Oklahoma by the superior quality of the climate. Many of the immigrants of the early days had strong sanitary reasons for preferring a change of climate.

To be more explicit, most of the invalids had been threatened with symptoms of throat trouble. So sudden and dangerous is this disease that the slightest delay in moving to a milder and different climate is apt to be fatal, the sufferer dying at the end of a few minutes and a long rope.

A great many men as soon as they heard of Oklahoma left their old homes in the states, left immediately, between two days, the necessity of their departure being so urgent that they were obliged to borrow the horse on which they immigrated. All of these invalids recovering on reaching Oklahoma. Some of them who would not have lived twenty-four hours in their old homes have reached a green old age here by carefully avoiding the causes that led to their former troubles and have never again been in any danger of the bronchial trouble already referred to.

As soon as it was discovered that this country was favorably disposed toward invalids a large

number of that class of unfortunate came to Oklahoma.—Davis Store News.
